THE BURMA IMMIGRATION (EMERGENCY PROVISIONS) (EXTENSION) ACT, 1949.*

[ACT XXV, 1949.] (26th April, 1949.)

It is hereby enacted as follows:-

- 1. This Act may be called the Burma Immigration (Emergency Provisions) (Extension) Act. 1949.
- 2. The Burma Immigration (Emergency Provisions) Act (Burma Act. No. XXXI of 1947) shall extend to the Karenni State.¹

THE KARENNI STATE (EXTENSION OF LAWS) ACT, 1949.†

[ACT XXXV, 1949.] (30th June, 1949.)

It is hereby enacted as follows:-

- 1. This Act may be called the Karenni State 1 (Extension of Laws) Act, 1949.
- 2. (1) The enactments mentioned in column (1) of the Schedule as amended up to date together with the rules made thereunder shall apply to the Karenni State 1 subject to the modifications and adaptations, if any, set forth in column (2).
- (2) They shall come into force on such date or dates as the President may, by notification, appoint and different dates may be appointed for different enactments.
- 3. Subject to the provisions of the Constitution, the President may, by notification, make such further modifications and adaptations in column (2) of the Schedule in respect of any enactment mentioned therein as he may deem necessary.
- 4. For the purpose of facilitating the application of any enactment mentioned in the Schedule, any Court may construe the enactment with such alterations or modifications, not affecting the substance, as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.
